SAFE BOATING THROUGH EDUCATION

From the Commander Cdr David Walsh, AP



wo boats from the Charleston Power Squadron made the trip from Charleston to Jacksonville, FL for the Annual Meeting of the United States Power Squadrons. Art and Merle Clark went in their cruiser "Sunday Drive." Wendy and I made the trip in our boat "Reely Fun." Our trip went well with both boats operating at their peak and good weather, for the most part. In fact, we made the entire trip on schedule, leaving Charleston on 20 February and returning on 28 February. Also attending the USPS Annual Meeting (but going by car) were the Squadron's Educational Officer Chet Rogers, Staff Commander Harl Porter and Betsy Porter, Past Commander Ed Kridler and Cindy Kridler and Past District Commander Robert Gissell and Nancy Gissell. Here is a brief report on the 2007 Annual Meeting.

The USPS Annual Meeting had a full agenda including the Governing Board, and special meetings on education, membership and a variety of other topics. Members from Charleston attended many meetings, placed an entry into the national teaching aid competition and participated in the Governing Board and the Annual Business Meeting.

Chief Commander Ernest Marshburn opened the Annual Meeting and reported on the state of the USPS. He said that many changes were made at the National Headquarters in the past year. Most significantly were cost savings and staff reduction that resulted in the first balanced budget in many years. Membership stabilized last year with the organization's "head count" almost the same as the previous year. Commander Marshburn said that USPS is struggling to maintain membership and that many more changes are needed to assure the long term health of the organization.

Organizationally, USPS is about to be modernized. The National Planning Committee recommended that the USPS overhaul the way it conducts business. This initiative would empower the National Bridge to act decisively and in a timely manner on behalf of the organization. The complex system of voting at national meetings that requires different colored cards for each member group will be simplified. The Governing Board will be expanded to better represent districts, squadrons, and individual members. An Operating Committee composed of the national officers will be given greater flexibility in implementing the various directives of the Governing Board. More details on these changes will be published in upcoming issues of the *Ensign*.

A major change affecting local squadrons was the Governing Board's decision to waive the boating safety examination requirement for membership eligibility in USPS for the next three years. Up until now, prospective members were required to pass a USPS or other proctored boating safety exam or have a captain's license before being eligible for USPS membership. Now, boaters can join the squadron without passing an examination. Subsequent to this decision, the Charleston Power Squadron's Executive Committee voted to follow National USPS's decision and waived our testing requirement for membership. The reason for this change was to make it easier to recruit new members to the power squadron.

fter attending the USPS Annual Meeting in February and the District 26 Spring Conference in March, I have the distinct impression that our squadron is one of the most effective in making use of Boat Smart, both as a teaching device for new boaters and as a recruitment device for bringing new members to the Power Squadron. For those of you unfamiliar with our program, we offer Boat Smart every Tuesday evening. It takes four weeks to complete the course, but students may start on any Tuesday evening, and after completing four consecutive classes, they are ready to take the exam. If they miss a class, they can wait until the next time that class comes up and then take the exam. While most squadrons are offering Boat Smart two or three times and year, we are, in effect, offering it twelve times a year.

We should thank Steve Kromer and David Walsh who teach the course. They have invested a great deal of effort into structuring it so that any student can complete Boat Smart in four weeks from the time that they first show up at Headquarters on a Tuesday evening. We should also thank Janice Kromer and Wendy Walsh who also attend the class sessions, take care of the paper work, and, most importantly, recruit Boat Smart students for membership in the Squadron. It has been a very successful effort, and is a major reason why our squadron is growing at a time when most squadrons are decreasing in membership.

HF Radar System Measures Ocean Waves and Surface Current


Three Charleston Power Squadron members attended the South Carolina Sea Grant Extension Program HF Radar Outreach Workshop on Monday 5 March. Cdr David Walsh, Wendy Walsh and Harl Porter drove to Fripp Island (near Port Royal) then boarded a small boat for Pritchards Island which is owned by the University of South Carolina. Boat trip was approximately five minutes followed by half mile walk on the beach to their facility.

The 23 invited guests were briefed by the Project Manager, Dr. Rich Styles, and two others on their HF Radar wave measuring program. We were first given briefings on both HF Backscatter Radar principles and its application to measuring wave speed and direction. Then all were given a tour of the antenna arrays on the beach followed by looking at the transmitter, 12 receivers and data processing equipment back at their facility. The workshop concluded with a "show and tell" of the wave data they had collected.

Technical characteristics of the \$180K HF Backscatter Radar systems are: Frequency -8.35 MHz, Power - 30 watts, frequency modulation with 0.43 second chip into four transmit antennas. The 12 receive antennas are arranged as a linear array (in line) along the beach and the system calculates the direction of the received signal from the phase angle at each antenna. Coverage area is up to 120 nm in a 120 degree fan.

The system is composed of a minimum of two sites. Currently there is only one other site in the Carolinas and Georgia. It is located south of Savannah on St. Catherine's Island. They would like to obtain funding and install a third system near Folly Beach. Each site operates on the same frequency and the transmitters alternate every 15 minutes. System is near real time; latency is approximately one hour (time to process the data from both sites and make it available on their web site). They hope to start posting near real time results from their HF Backscatter Radar system in April. I have spoken with the bridge operator who tells me we need to call the day before to make arrangements. I will coordinate the bridge opening for our flotilla. The bridges are operated from 7AM to 3:30PM daily.

Lunch at Gilligan's promises to be a great dining experience. Gillgan's has worked hard to build a reputation as a fine family restaurant by serving the freshest seafood and other ingredients in a very friendly, casual atmosphere. Our entrée choices are: Fried Combo (Shrimp & Flounder); Grilled Chicken; Grilled Shrimp; and Low country Stir Fry (Shrimp, sausage, cabbage, w/ Cajun). Our side is Red Rice and Salads will be provided for all entrees. Cost is 6.50 per person.

To round out the day, we must be underway not later than 1415 to ensure we get back to the Strawberry Bridge by 1500 before the operator leaves for the day. So, bring the family for a wonderful fun packed Charleston Power Squadron day!!

New Dues Rates Beginning June 1, 2007

Active Members will not notice much of an increase of \$8.40. Both National and District stressed that we value Family Members. *National will send a letter to these members and include a coupon for \$10.00 good at the National Ship's Store or \$10.00 off on educational materials.*

National will mail dues notices by the end of April, and dues are due by June 1, 2007. Those members who joined after June 1, 2006 will not receive dues notices until their anniversary month.

The change is only for dues, there will be no changes in Status - that is, we will still have Active, Additional Active, and Family Members.

Neither District 26 nor our Squadron charges dues for Family Members.


