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SAFE BOATING THROUGH EDUCATION

FREE ELECTRONIC CHARTS FROM MAPTECH

Maptech, as part of its on going relationship with USPS, has made all of their electronic charts available to any member for free. Here's how you go about getting them:

- 1. Log onto www.usps.org
- 2. Click on "Members Area". Highlight the tab on top for the "Educational" Department
- 3. Pick "Ed Dept Home Page" from the list by clicking on it
- 4. Now this is the tough part click on the big box that says "Maptech Free Charts"
- You will be connected to a page that asks for your certificate number and zip code. Fill these in and click on continue. There is an option here for you to allow the site to put a cookie on your machine to remember you information.
- 6. You are now on Maptech's web site.
- 7. Again, click on the big box that says "Download Free NOAA Charts"
- 8. Follow the instructions and you'll get the free download. From this same area you can download Maptech's chart navigator software.

The beauty of this whole thing is if you have the chart navigator software, you can use the free charts to work out routes one your computer for taking your boat somewhere and then upload the routes to your GPS.

Try it. It's fun. If y'all want to have a class about how to use Chart Navigator and the electronic charts, let me know and we'll see if we can't schedule something.

Below are our Squadron's achievements for the past year. What I came to realize is that most of what we do is inherently safety related; everything from community service to just plain having fun. We did a great job last year at a great time to boot.

Public Boating courses – Included on local NOAA radio for National Safe Boating Week.

Post & Courier Editorial – Comments concerning two local teenagers lost at sea for several days while fishing

Recreational Boating Safety Visitation Program – One member is certified and our campaign to promote boating safety through local businesses and marine dealerships has begun.

School Program – We have begun teaching boating safety at Burke and West Ashley schools. The first Boating Safety courses begin next week at the two schools.

Newspaper Article – Our School Program is listed in the Community Education insert in the Post and Courier, Charleston's local paper.

Boat Shows – We manned our USPS booth at major boat shows; one in-water at Brittlebank Park and the other at the Charleston Convention Center. Emphasis is on boating safety through course offerings, safety and related handouts, and USPS membership.

VSE Program – We now have five members who conduct VSE inspections as requested at our monthly functions and wherever needed.

-Conducted VSE days at Charleston City Marina and participated in the National Marina Festival at the Cooper River Marina where we conducted VSE checks and operated our safe boating booth.

- -Numerous VSE checks were successfully achieved at both events and throughout the year.
- -Two VCS officers attended the Great Loop Association Rendezvous providing safe boating information and conducting VSE checks.
- -Boating Safety Courses We are now conducting boating safety courses every Tuesday. Each course has five segments. One segment is offered each Tuesday making it possible to offer a total of 10 courses per year. This schedule also provides maximum flexibility for participants.

Strategic Planning – We have created a viable strategic plan to improve boating safety and squadron operations. One goal is to increase membership thereby creating safer boating in Charleston. Emphasis is on encouraging participation of potential members in the Safe Boating Course which is a membership prerequisite.

Articles – Relevant and informative boating safety articles are included in The Palmetto Log, our monthly newsletter.

Mall Activities – We set up and manned our booth one time this year at a local mall. Results were disappointing compared to other booth activities such as boat shows.

Parade of Boats – We have partnered with the City of Charleston in conducting the Christmas Parade of Boats in the Charleston Harbor in early December. Our functions are to provide escort services to and from the event for participating boaters who are uncomfortable with night boating, buoy illumination, administrative support and general safe boating during the event. This is a major safe boating undertaking by our squadron.

Cooperative Charting – During this year we completed 80% of chart 11518 and 100% of chart 11524. Additionally we have agreed to add chart 11522 to our cooperative charting program. This year we found five discrepancies in day marker or buoy conditions; all were reported.

Bridge Blast

500-foot, 1,000 ton section of the Pearman Bridge over Drum Island and Shipyard Creek was explosively demolished on Tuesday 15 November 2005. To witness this historic event, squadron members Art and Merl Clark, Stan and Karen Whitman, Chet Rogers and David Walsh took Clark's boat "Sunday Drive" into Charleston Harbor. "Sunday Drive" left Duncan's Boat Harbour at 0830 with Art at the helm. The group met earlier for donuts and coffee and planned to anchor in a designated safety viewing area off Drum Island. The day was a boater's dream, 70 degrees and nearly calm winds. When we arrived in Charleston Harbor many boats were already anchored. Captain Art skillfully maneuvered "Sunday Drive" through a sea of small boats to anchor at a location giving us an excellent view of the Pearman Bridge. We arrived at 0945 and awaited the demolition. Through binoculars we could see yellow painted areas at strategic points on the bridge structure. Presumably, the yellow paint indicated the placement of charges. Just before 1000 a horn sounded indicating the 5-minute warning. Later, a second horn sounded and then the bridge came down. Even though we were prepared, the sound and concussion of the blast was startling.

Leadership Development Class

We even had our boat mentioned in the Post and Courier. Here is an excerpt from the Post and Courier article that appeared on December 4, 2005.

The Reely Fun motored in for Saturday's Parade of Boats sporting a rendering of the Ravenel Bridge. And then someone noticed the Que Sera had the same image strung between its masts. Well, we didn't have fire works or win any prizes. We just had a "Reely Fun" time. Would we enter our boat next year? Yes, and we recommend others to join in the fun."

From Lt/C Bob Gulbrandsen - Crew of the "Victory" - Work Boat at Marker G5

"A good time was had by all aboard the Victory. We supplied light to the danger point (shallow water) near the G5 marker by lighting the marker and directing the parade in to safe waters. We also, by position, got front row seats to the parade and the fireworks during the parade. A cool and clear evening provided a beautiful backdrop for the evenings festivities. Duty aboard the Victory was low keyed, monitoring the event on VHF radio, supplying a safe direction for the parade boats to follow, enjoying the holiday lights and the fellowship aboard ship."

From Bobby Carrier – Captain of Parade Boat Phunee Bouy

"We had a fantastic time. The boat ran great - only problem was my mic went out on the radio but that was okay as I was planning on replacing the unit anyway. It was old and crappy. We followed David and Art down to the MUSTER area then followed David back. This is a MUST DO event on our calendar every year. I dressed up as Santa Claus and took my bullhorn with me. We had the crowds going pretty good and gave the squadron some good plugs. I have talked to a few people that were spectators and said they could hear me LOUD and CLEAR along the battery."

From Nick Russo - Captain of the Command Boat Oops in Charleston Harbor

"We started out short one VHF Radio – which is a real problem for the Command Boat. But we contacted No Sense, and then pulled up along side of her at the City Marina and borrowed one of there's. Anyone who knows Steve Kromer knows he always has spares of everything! We had some trouble lining up all of the boats, but the Parade turned out great."

From P/C Charlotte Yeomans – Spectator near Battery Park

"The Parade looked good to me. The boats seemed to stay in line and, in general, they stayed together. It looked well organized as you watched from the shore."

From Steve Kromer, Captain of the Judges Boat – No Sense

"Our departure from The City Marina with all five Judges and their families on board was rather ominous. We had a great plan for undocking and plenty of crew. But our dockhand insisted on doing things his way, and we managed to leave crewmember Mike King on the dock and our boarding ladder hanging into the Harbor. We recovered both ladder and Mike by redocking further down the Megadock. But we had the same stubborn dockhand, so that didn't go as smoothly as planned, either. Once we got off the dock the parade was great. We anchored right off the Battery just at the point where the parade turns to enter the Ashley River. We had a great view of the boats coming from our port side, turning in the Ashley River and then going by on our starboard side. Funny thing, none of the old-eyed judges could see the numbers on the boats. The kids we had on board could, though, and so they read the numbers of the boats for the judges. The cruise back to the dock was uneventful."

I'm having a hard time finding the words to express my appreciation for all of the hard work and the extraordinary participation of the members who made this the most successfully Parade Of Boats in some years. This is the most enthusiastically received event that we've had since I've been in the Charleston Power Squadron.

Perhaps the best statement about our participation was from Ray Swagerty from the City Of Charleston who told me that he wasn't sure that he would have been able to pull off the parade this year if not for the Squadron help.

Congratulations to you all and thank you. Next year we'll do it again and have even more fun.
