

Starting Tues September 12 at 6:30pm. This is the third of three Marine Electronics classes, the other two (Marine Electrical Systems and Marine Communications Systems) which were taught last year. There are no prerequisites for this class.




This Canadian Power Squadron class has been adopted by USPS for use by all of our squadrons. This class concentrates on GPS Navigation; but class will include extra material on Depth Sounders, Radar, AIS and Electronics Maintenance. You will learn to navigate using GPS and paper charts as well as electronic charting devices. This course will allow the pleasure craft operator to navigate safely knowing his exact location at all times. Class will be taught by P/C (and Past Staff Commander for Marine Electronics) Harl Porter, SN. Extensive material has been added to this class to bring it up to date and cover all aspects of Marine Navigational Systems. A DVD will be given to each student that contains all class room slides plus extra (not tested) chapters on Depth Sounder, Radar, AIS and Electronics

Maintenance.




Figure 1 – of and from the Yorktown

Captain Blackbeard and Nemo left a message. "Keep a wary eye matey, you never know, when we will return to the Harbor known as Charleston"




Figure 3 – Squadron Swimmers hunting Nemo

Rescue at Sea

Harl and Karl (Porter and Naugle) rescued a boater in the water next to his swamped Kayak.

On a Wednesday in July, after lunch in Shem Creek, Palmetto Elephant came across a swamped kayak with a person in the water holding on to its side. He had fallen out of the kayak, and could not get back into it. Picture is from the internet and is not an actual picture of the incident.



We stopped near him and asked if he needed help (it was obvious that he did and that he was tired). It was noted that he WAS NOT wearing his life jacket. After going "dead in the water" near him, he approached our swim platform. The boarding ladder was lowered, we took the kayak "under tow", and he was able to climb the boarding ladder (with difficulty) and got onto the boat's swim platform. Several items were taken out of the kayak (including an unused life jacket) so that Karl and

Harl could inverted the kayak to empty it of water; then it was returned to the water.

We asked if he had been swamped by a power boat wake? The reply was "No," that he fell out retrieving a paddle.

We asked if we were the first boat to see him in distress in the water? The reply was "Yes", we were the first boat to pass by.

That was good news: he had not been overturned by the wake from a bad boater and we were the first boat to see him in the water. Can you imagine a boat not stopping to help?

Harl and Betsy Porter had been kayaking on the Edisto River on the 4th of July. We both wore our inflatable life jackets all the time we were on the water and each life jacket had an attached whistle.

The grateful kayaker thanked us and shook our hands before getting back into his kayak. We felt sorry for the kayaker (believe he had a close call) and did not give him a Safety Lecture (in hind sight we should have insisted that he put on his life jacket before reentering his kayak). Wear a life jacket when kayaking with an attached whistle. They could save your life especially if there is not a Good Samaritan around to rescue you.

News from National

Test Your Mustang Life Jacket

We are always told as a Vessel Examiner to wear our life jackets to project the idea of safety to the boating public. I am sure that most VEs have done so over the past 8 years that we have had them.

Now as we head into the boating season and all of the associated activities, I would suggest that the first thing a VE should do is examine and test his/her Mustang Inflatable life jacket. It is suggested that this operation be performed every 2 to 3 months. I bet you have not even done it once in the 8 years you have had the jackets. I am suggesting this exercise because we have found a few jackets that won't hold air. If one of these is found I suggest that it be destroyed and disposed of because the total life expectancy is only 10 years.

So how do we test our jacket? Open it up along the Velcro seams as shown in Figure 1 until it looks like figure 2. Then remove the cap on the oral inflation tube (shown in figure 2) and inflate the Life Jacket orally.

Then keep the jacket inflated overnight. If it fails to hold air all night it is defective. If it holds air ok, then reverse the oral inflation cap and compress the jacket to remove all of the air. Once deflated, replace the cap to its original position and fold the sides back and press the Velcro seams to hold the jacket together.

Now if you happen to really need the jacket while doing a VSC (Heaven forbid you fall into the water) the life jacket would be known to be useable.

Safety Column

DON'T TRUST LUCK, ALWAYS BE SAFE

What bad (unsafe) habits have you acquired after several years of boating? After completing the Basic Power Squadron Safe Boating Class, we knew how to be a safe boater. Unfortunately, after years of boating we may have learned unsafe boating habits. DNR Captain Robert McCullough said: "If you go out a lot, one's familiar always breeds content." Unless we practice safe boating every time we go out on the water, the law of



averages will eventually catch up with us, and a preventable accident will happen.

At the end of May there was a boat fire here in Charleston near the fuel dock at Harborage at Ashley Marina. The blaze sank the boat on fire and damaged the boat next to it. The people on the boat escaped uninjured before their burning boat sank. Cause of the fire was not immediately known. My guess that they had gas (and gas fumes) in the bilge, add a spark and you have a flash fire.

We learned in our first Safe Boating Class to open the bilge before starting the boat (especially after fueling) and checking for fuel in the bilge. If fuel was detected (visually), immediately get off the boat and call the fire department. If no fuel was noted during the visual inspection, we were then taught to run the boat's blower for five (5) minutes (to vent any gas fumes out of the engine compartment) before starting the engine. After five minutes of running the blower, only then start the engine. After starting the engine, it is a good practice to again open the engine compartment and look for any problems (hoses leaking, belts slipping, etc.).

Before restarting your boat (after lunch, anchoring, drifting, etc.); again, check the bilge and run the bilge blower before restating your engine.


How many times have you started your boat without first checking the bilge and running the bilge blower for five minutes? Just because you got by with this bad habit in the past, does not mean that the next time you start you boat, without being safe, that a bad thing may happen.

Don't trust luck, every time before starting your engine, check your bilge for fuel and use your bilge blower.
