A couple of miles past the Tailrace, look for the signs for Jeffries Generating Station and Short Stay directing you to turn left. Turn left onto Powerhouse Road, then right onto Black Oak Rd., then left onto Short Stay Road.

Look for a Like button and click it. And it would be great if you would invite others to "Like" our page and join. Now you can begin posting updates about your boating activities. - 1. Fill out your comment
- 2. Leave your name or post anonymously
- 3. Press Submit.

That's it!

Finally, the blog is for information sharing, but comments on posts really are nice. So if you have an opinion, a thought or just like what you read, feel free to share.

THE PALMETTO LOG Boating Safety

Good Judgment and Life Jackets

On Saturday 21 January 2012 Mike and Judy Fauss invited Betsy and I on their 17-foot skiff *Hey Jude* for a boat ride from the Cooper River Marina to the squadron's lunch cruise at Vickery's Restaurant in Shim Creek. Also invited were two of their non-boater neighbors.

Captain Mike had everyone put on their life jackets before we got underway; he had extra for his guests (Betsy and I brought our own). Don't call them PFDs, they are Life Jackets designed to save your life if you end up in the water. He then made sure that they were properly fitted and said that they would be worn by all while we were on the water. He then showed us the Throwable Flotation Cushions that would be thrown to anyone who went over the side. Don't call them Throwable Seat Cushions, they are Throwable Floatation Cushions designed to provide additional flotation to a person already in the water. Then he showed us how to make a distress call on his VHF radio by pushing the Red Distress Button for over five seconds. He also instructed us that we were to remain seated (no moving around) while underway.

Several minutes after departing the sheltered waters of the marina we were in rough water and started taking heavy spray over the bow. Captain Mike exercised Good Judgment and turned his boat around and went back to the marina. He said we would drive to the lunch cruise at Vickery's as he did not think it would be either safe or comfortable to proceed in his boat. Perhaps the two non-boaters did not know that the weather was marginal and were disappointed that their promised boat trip was canceled. Our Captain exercised Good Judgment several times. First he made sure everyone had a Life Jacket on and that it was properly fitted. Next he gave a Safety Briefing. And lastly he had the confidence to say this trip would not be safe (or comfortable) and that we would go to lunch in our cars. Too many recreational boaters get into trouble on the water by failure to recognize when they should not be on the water. Another unsafe scenario is -Perceived need to return home. After making a Saturday trip to a marina and spending the night you get up Sunday morning and find the weather marginal. The unsafe boater will make a Bad Judgment call, perhaps based on wanting (needing) to go to work Monday morning, and proceed even knowing that the weather is marginal (and unsafe). The safe boater will exercise Good Judgment, and will call their boss telling them that it is unsafe to return from his boat trip on Sunday and therefore they need to take Monday as a day off (even if they have an important meeting with a customer Monday morning).

To paraphrase an Air Force expression – There are old boaters and there are bold boaters; but, there are no old bold boaters. Exercise Good Judgment and wear a properly fitted Life Jacket.

Palmetto Swamp Fox Adventure Race 17 March 2012

I received a request by email through the Squadron Google Group from Secretary Donald Todd:

"Palmetto Swamp Fox Adventure Race lost their safety boat. They need a safety boat at 0700 Saturday 17MAR12 departing McClellanville to Awendaw Creek. Race should last until 1200."

I thought it would be a great challenge. I replied to Steve Morrone of KanDo Adventures LLC. and arranged to be his support boat for the 51 teams of adventure boaters, I thought. After going to the web site www.kandoadventures.com I learned that they run many adventure races around the state from Augusta to Charleston and many places in between. So I rounded up two friends and we were off to the town of McClellanville at 4 am on Saturday with *Neverland* being trailered. The boat was in the water before 7 am. Armed with a huge First Aid kit and their map, we traveled the river watching over kayaks and canoes in a race that would last until 7 pm. They would paddle 10 miles with 2 stops for orienteering and jogging. They would abandon the Intracoastal Waterway for their running shoes and 5-10 mile trek. Then they would jump on their bikes for a 40 mile ride through the Francis Marion State Park on flag marked trails. While they were off the water, we took a break and boated to Capers Island.

If you want to test your endurance, I think we have found the way to prove that there is something as hard as a triathlon. This race requires navigation and map reading skills. Our hats are off to them. Ken Neuhaus, Jim Paliama, and Karl Naugle were glad to represent the Power Squadron and lend a support boat to the first leg of the race. We do not want to enter that race no matter how big the prize. Join them later this year in a version of *Survival Charleston* patterned after the T.V. show "Survival".

Squadron History and Awards Book

I have been putting together a Book giving early USPS History and Abbreviated Charleston Squadron History with Awards earned by our squadron in the past 25-years. Book is located in the glass bookcase in the hall leading into our big meeting room. Please take a look at it. This month I am highlighting the 1946 Organization Meeting Minutes that established Charleston Power Squadron. We were almost named the Palmetto Power Squadron.

Organization Meeting Minutes

8 March 1946

Called to order at 2030 by Mr. I. L. McKenzie as temporary chairman.

Mr. McKenzie requested Mr. L.C. Ripley to act as temp. Secty.

Mr. McKenzie stated purpose of the meeting and asked will of those present.

Motion made by Mr. Thomas and seconded by Mr. Soidke to proceed with organizing a power squadron was carried.

Mr. McKenzie then stated that we should select a name for the local squadron.

- *Mr. Thomas-seconded by Mr. Willett proposed "Palmetto. "Mr. Barsh seconded by Mr. DeSouza proposed "Charleston." On voting" "Charleston" was chosen.*
- Mr. McKenzie then read article in USPS Constitution on "Duty of Officers."
- *Mr. McKenzie was nominated for Commander. No other nomination being offered; motion to close nominations and unanimous ballot be cast for Mr. McKenzie was carried.*
- Nominations for Lieut. Commander were then opened and the following were nominated: Dr. M.A. DeSouza, Mr. E.M. Sodke, Mr. Allan Mustard and Dr. Archie Myers. Motion carried to close nominations. Mr. Thomas was requested to act as teller. Dr. DeSouza requested that he be allowed to decline. Secret ballots resulted in six (6) votes for Mr. Sodke, Five (5) for Mr. Mustard and two (2) for Dr. Myers. A second secret ballot was spread between Mr. Sodke and Mr. Mustard. Mr. Mustard withdrew and Mr. Sodke was declared elected without a ballot being taken.
- Nominations for Secretary were then called and Mr. Ripley was nominated. No further nominations being made; motion to close Nominations and unanimous ballot be cast for Mr. Ripley carried.
- Nominations for Treasurer were then called for and Dr. Myers was nominated. No further nomination being made; motion to close nominations and unanimous ballot for Dr. Myers carried.

Application for charter was then circulated and eighteen (18) names were affixed.

- Motion made and seconded that local dues be two dollars (\$2.00) a year in addition to three dollars (\$3.00) national dues and five dollars (\$5.00) application fee was carried.
- Motion made and seconded that bylaws committee composed of the elective officers and such other members as the Commander saw fit meet and report at next meeting. Motion amended to adopt the Detroit USPS Constitution and bylaws with only such changes as necessary to make them applicable to Charleston. Amendment carried. Motion as amended carried.
- Motion made and seconded that the fourth Friday of each month at 8:00 PM be designated as regular meeting carried.
