#### **HURRICANE SEASON and DISASTER RELIEF - GET PREPARED**

June 1st was the start of hurricane season. I have been serving as the District 26 Liaison for



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Home Land Security. I have learned a great deal about how we, as a squadron, can join with FEMA and others in preparation for Hurricane season. We want to encourage you and your family members to think about how you can prepare.

One way we're encouraging folks to prepare is by signing up to receive hurricane safety tips directly to your mobile phone. By texting HURRICANE to 43362 (4FEMA), you can sign up to receive bi-weekly

hurricane safety tips. These tips are friendly reminders of the steps you can take to prepare your family and home for a hurricane.

For more safety tip lists, head over to www.fema.gov/text-messages or http://m.fema.gov/text-messages (on your mobile phone.) This provides subscription options and a list of commands you can use when texting 43362.

Another way to further our mission of public service is to join with FEMA and other national, state and local organizations to volunteer our time and energy in projects that help in times of disasters. Many areas in the USA will experience disasters this year. They will need help in many different ways.

The most recent fires out west in Arizona where 19 of our elite Hot Shot fire fighting team members lost their lives hoping to save people's homes and lives is an example of a disaster with which we can help without going there. We did

# Boating Safety by Squadron Safety Officer, P/C Harl Porter, SN

**Target Fixation** –Target Fixation and Situational Awareness are the two sides of the same coin; Situational Awareness is good and Target Fixation is bad. As covered previously, Situational Awareness, for us recreational boaters, is knowing where you are, locations of other vessels, location of hazards to navigation, and range and bearing to next "waypoint."

Target Fixation for us boaters is anything that we focus on and forget that job one is the safe operation of our boat. Target Fixation, for a military pilot, is focusing on attacking a target and forgetting that job one is to safely fly the airplane. Target Fixation for a military pilot may cause them to fly their airplane into the ground. Target Fixation for us boaters is anything that we focus on and forget that job one is the safe operation of our boat. Target Fixation for us boaters may lead to hitting a Navaid, running aground or a collision with another boat.

Target Fixation for boaters includes focusing on instruments (GPS / Chart Plotter / Radar) rather than concentrating on the safe operation of the boat; talking on radio or cell phone rather than concentrating on the safe operation of the boat (Don't text while at the helm); watching

and talking with passengers rather than concentrating on the safe operation of the boat. Job one is the safe operation of your boat; don't lose Situational Awareness by engaging in Target Fixation.

- Job one is the safe operation of your boat
- Don't get distracted (Target Fixation)

**Pre Flight** – If you have a gas engine you should always run the engine compartment Blower for five minutes before starting the engine; this includes after lunch or a raft-up. Then check your engine and bilge (Smell gas? Anything obviously wrong with engine?) Next check Engine Oil and other Fluid Levels. Check Belt Tension and Hoses. Bilge Pump operational? These are minimum engine-off checks; add other items as required. Another Past Commander always adds this check: After starting the engine he opens up the engine compartment to see if all is well with the engine running.

Recently *Palmetto Elephant* passed all visual engine-off checks. After starting the engine I opened up the engine compartment and got wet as one hose had a leak that was not noticed during the engine-off checks. Emergency repair would consist of taping the hose first with electrical tape, then taping it with duct tape and lastly putting a hose clamp on the hose. This would be a good temporary repair to get home, but not an acceptable fix before leaving my home marine. I did the safe thing and replaced the hose (did not go boating that day).

# Vessel Safety Checks – 2013 Report by Vessel Safety Coordinator, Lt Carl Huff, AP

Hello fellow squadron members, I hope you are enjoying some time on the water now that summer is in full swing. I wanted to tell you a little about one of our groups in the Charleston Sail and Power Squadron – "Vessel Examiners."

VSC's are a very important part of our squadron activities both locally and nationally. We have 9 active Vessel Examiner's on our Charleston PS team :

We have completed approximately 85 vessel checks so far in 2013. This is a great effort toward our 2013 goal of 100 VSC's. We are currently in  $2^{nd}$  place in District 26 with completed VSC's. The district has completed approximately 628 VSC's total to date this year.

VSC's are very important to ensure you have the right equipment on board your vessel and key items (e.g.. navigation lights, visual distress signals, etc.).are working correctly

# Charleston Sail and Power Squadron to Receive the Richard E. Rettew Cooperative Charting Award Report by CSPS Cooperative Charting Chairman, P/C David Walsh, SN

The Charleston Sail and Power Squadron earned The Richard E. Rettew Cooperative Charting Award for 2012. This award is presented to the D/26 squadron that has shown the greatest achievement and improvement in cooperative charting from the previous year. Based on NOAA Cooperative Charting CC Web reports, credits and level of squadron participation, the Charleston Sail and Power Squadron finished second in the nation with total of 10,962 Cooperative Charting Credits. Squadron members submitted reports of inspections and depth survey in the Charleston area and participated in NOAA's Adopt-A-Chart program. The Charleston Squadron "adopted" charts are Nautical Charts 11518 and 11522. These charts cover the Intracoastal Waterway from McClellanville, SC to Beaufort, SC and the Stono and North Edisto Rivers.

Special thanks go to the squadron members who worked hard to earn the 2012 Richard E. Rettew Cooperative Charting Award. - 6. Checks should be payable to CSPS. Ads will be run only if payment has been made prior to or accompanying submission of ad copy.
- 7. Ads will appear in one issue only. Request for renewal must be made to the editor in writing and must include additional fee, as described above.
- 8. All ads must include appropriate contact information. Interested persons or potential buyers or customers should not contact the CSPS contact line nor the Palmetto Log editor regarding items or services advertised.
