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Safe Boating Through Education

## From The Commander Cdr Joe Schady, AP



It feels like it has been awhile since I wrote my last article. The month of May has been very eventful for me on the water. Since we will be very involved in rewriting the By-Laws and planning some big events in the coming months, I thought I would use this time to write about my last boating experience which was something very new for me.

I grew up boating, but never had much interest in fishing. Since moving down to Charleston, I thought it might be a good thing to do being so close to the open ocean. I have been toying around going out past the jetties and have done some fishing about 10 miles out. But now I was ready, and a few friends and I decided to go Mahi Mahi fishing out on the ledge.

On 22 May, we left the dock in our 26' Scout at 0600 which was probably a little late for any die hard fishing boat, but I am really not that comfortable travelling 25 knots in the dark. We reached the Edisto Banks which are about 45 miles from the jetties. The ride was fairly smooth. The seas were 2-4 ft. with hardly any wind. We had our lines in the water around 0830 and plotted a course for a place called the 226 Hole about 10 miles east, trolling at about 6 knots.

We hooked our first fish at 0900 in about 200 feet of water, but the line came undone right when we got the fish to the boat. Our second hit was somewhere around 1000, but again no luck. The fish jumped out of the water near the boat and threw the hook. At this point, I was thinking we have had a very successful trip. I had more new experiences on my boat in the last 4 hours than I have had on a boat in the last 10 years. That being said, we were committed to getting at least one fish in the boat.

Around 1100 we came upon a large string of weeds and started trolling up and down the line, and we hooked our third fish of the day. It took about 20 minutes, but we finally got this fish in the boat (see pictures on next page). We continued fishing until 1300 when we turned around and headed home. At this point, we were 55 miles from the jetties and in over 1500 feet of water. I will tell you the truth that it is interesting when your depth finder stops working because it is too deep.

On the way back we stopped off at the Charleston 60 Reef and did some bottom fishing. We caught a bunch of small fish but nothing of any note. We were back at the dock at 1730 exhausted and with one fish in the boat.

I know some would say that we only caught one fish while there are stories of people catching 10-20 fish when they go out lately, but for my first trip, where I was the captain, I could not have asked for anything better.



# WEAR IT! (a Life Jacket May Save Your Life)

In 2009 (2010 statistics are not available) there were 736 boating fatalities. This is the highest number of boating fatalities since 2002, and the trend has been up the last three years.

Over half the boating fatalities (543) were from drowning. Only 87 of the 2009 drowning victims were wearing their life jackets. Over half the boating fatalities (393) were on open motorboats and includes 279 drowning fatalities. The second most dangerous boat, with 93 fatalities, is a canoe; almost all the canoe fatalities (86) were from drowning.

There were only 9 boating fatalities on sailboats; four of which were from drowning. Cabin powerboats had 45 boating fatalities; 26 of which were from drowning.

Wear your life jacket, it may save your life, especially if you are on an open motorboat or a canoe.



#### **Squadron Booth at the Charleston Harbor Fest**

The Charleston Sail and Power Squadron sponsored an informational booth at the Charleston Harbor Fest, 12-15 May 2011. Charleston Harbor Fest is an annual event hosted by the South Carolina Maritime Foundation, a public nonprofit organization that owns and operates the tall ship *Spirit of South Carolina*. This festival is one of the major maritime events of the Foundation to help fund educational programs. This year's Harbor Fest hosted the VELUX 5 OCEANS around the world single-handed sail boat race. This race started in La Rochelle France and sailed around the world, in a course of 30,000 nautical miles. Charleston Harbor was the last leg of the race, leaving Charleston on 14 May 2011 and returning to La Rochelle France. The lead boat in the race was *Le Pingouin*, sailed by Charleston native Brad Van Liew.

Special thanks go to the squadron's members who manned the booth, greeted visitors and handed out boating safety information at this three-day event. 
#### **July Cruise**

Charleston Sail and Power Squadron members participated in a District 26 Cooperative Charting Seminar and round-table discussion on 20 May 2011. The Seminar was held at the NOAA Service Center on the former US Navy base in North Charleston. Horst Boettge, District 26 Cooperative Charting Chairman, lead the session. Mr. Boettge presented online demonstrations showing how to log into CCWEB, the Cooperative Charting web site, and enter charting reports. Members who brought their laptop computers and had password access could follow along as Mr. Boettge showed how to access CCWEB and submit Cooperative Charting reports. The seminar included instructions for submitting Inspection Reports, Small Craft Facility Reports, Nautical Chart Items and Depth Surveys.
