COOPERATIVE CHARTING REPORT

At the District 26 Fall Conference, The Charleston Sail and Power Squadron received "Honor Roll" Status, for its participation in the National Oceanographic Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Cooperative Charting Program. The program, called "Adopt-A-Chart," is a joint effort between the United States Power Squadrons (USPS)



and NOAA where USPS volunteers collect data and submit reports that NOAA uses to improve the accuracy of its navigation charts.

The Charleston Sail and Power Squadron "adopted" Nautical Charts 11518 (Casino Creek to the Beaufort River) and Chart 11522 (Stono and North Edisto Rivers). This year our Cooperative Charting Teams made systematic evaluations of these charts. They also conducted depth surveys that identified shoaling in the Folly River.

According to David Walsh, our Squadron's Cooperative Charting Chairman, the Adopt-A-Chart pro-

gram is a great excuse to go boating. We have approximately 115 miles of the most scenic area on the ICW and our ever-changing Charleston Harbor to observe. Participation in the program does not require owning a boat. The squadron's charting teams match up people and boats, usually 3 people per boat. After an initial training session, each team chooses a portion of a chart for evaluation. Teams then can conduct charting on their own schedules. The results are entered in CCWEB, NOAA's Cooperative Charting Web Site.

We are preparing for the 2012 Cooperative Charting season and volunteers are needed for the squadron's charting teams. 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AMENDED BYLAWS APPROVED

The squadron approved the amended bylaws at the 08 September 2011 general meeting. P/C Dick Howells, JN and P/C David Walsh, SN served on the Rules Committee. The primary reason for amending the bylaws was to bring our bylaws in line with the bylaws of the United States Power Squadrons. The main change involved classes of membership. We now have (1) Individual memberships and (2) family unit memberships. Family units include all household members. All members will be active members. Household members under the age of 18 cannot vote or hold elected or appointed offices.

NEW DUES STRUCTURE

The squadron approved the new dues structure at the annual meeting on 13 October 2011. The squadron portion of dues for individual members will be \$40.00 and for family units will be \$55.00. These rates will go into effect for members who expiration date is May 31, 2012 and later. Check the expiration date on your certificate which you received from USPS.

Membership dues include squadron portion, District 26 portion, and USPS portion.

District 26 portion will be \$7.50 for individuals and \$11.25 for family units.

USPS portion will be \$43.00 for individuals and \$64.50 for family units.

In summary, 2012-2013 dues for individuals will be \$40.00 (squadron), \$7.50 (district) and \$43.00 (USPS) for a total of \$90.50.

Family units in 2012-2013 will be billed \$55.00 (squadron), \$11.50 (district) and \$64.50 (USPS) for a total of \$130.75.

REMINDER! WINTERIZE YOUR BOAT

Here in Charleston, temperatures fall below freezing in the months of December, January and February. Water left in boats can freeze and causing damage. Boats stored outside or in an open-walled dry-stack are especially vulnerable to freeze damage. Consult your boatowner's manual for winterizing recommendations for your specific boat. If you don't have an owner's manual, get one from a boat dealer. Also, a Google search may identify where you can download your boat and engine manuals for free. Here are some typical recommendations for preparing your boat for the off-season.

Almost empty fuel tanks can condense moisture inside causing corrosion and/or water accumulation. So, fill your boat's fuel tank to "almost full" capacity, allowing space for fuel expansion. Add a fuel stabilizer that is approved your fuel system. Also replace your boat's fuel filters and water separator .

For gasoline engines, guard against corrosion by spraying "fogging oil" inside the carburetor and down the spark plug holes. Spray cans of engine fogging oil are available at marine supply and most boat dealers.

For outboards and I/O's drain and replace the gear oil in lower units. This removes any water from the lower unit and protects internal parts. For inboards, drain and replace the transmission oil.

For indirect cooled engines, drain and replace the coolant. Drain the "raw water" side of your cooling system and replace the raw water impeller. For direct cooled engines, open the engine block drain plugs and drain the system as directed in your owner's manual and replace the raw water impeller.

Disconnect the boat's batteries and store them inside. Removing your battery is not recommended for boats stored in the water. Remember to add battery water and store the battery in a fully charged state.

Drain the boat's bilge. Water left in the bilge can freeze and damage gear, such as bilge pumps, floats and sensors that are in the bilge.

Empty the marine head and its holding tank. Drain the fresh water system, including water heater, sink, shower and the piping system. Some boat manufactures call for adding antifreeze to the boat sinks and water systems.

Finally, follow your owner's manual and grease all external fittings on engines, drives and controls. A properly winterized boat will make it through the winter, undamaged, and be ready to "hit the water running" in the spring.
