Just as squadrons excel when their individual members contribute, District 26 is enriched by the collaboration of its 13 squadrons. The spring conference featured sessions where commanders and other officers could exchange ideas and offer support to neighboring squadrons. Topics included strategies for membership diversity, community outreach and social and educational programs for members. Our membership chair Joan Naugle, AP, and AO Paul Wood attended the conference and participated in the exchange of best practices.

Safe Use of Electricity on Your Boat

Even a seemingly small dose of electricity can kill you if you happen to touch a "hot" wire with one hand while touching a "ground" with your other hand. 120-volt AC current over 20-milliamps (20/1000 amperes), passing through the chest cavity, may be lethal (deadly).

High humidity and wet skin can increase the danger! A person with dry skin in a dry cli-

mate (think Colorado Desert) has a skin resistance of approximately 24,000 ohms; a person with wet skin in a humid climate (think South Carolina in the summer) has a skin resistance of only 4,000 ohms. Given 120-volts and 4,000 ohms, current flow will be 30-milliamps (**NOT SAFE**). *Ohms Law* (I = E/R) is covered in Marine Electrical Systems. A Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) device will trip with a leakage current as low as five (5) milliamps (5/1,000 amperes). While this current through your body is not comfortable, it is not lethal but it is an immediate warning that there is a potential danger. A GFCI device serves to protect people from a lethal shock. GFCI outlets can be easily recognized by the TEST and RESET buttons on them.



All 120-volt AC outlets on a boat must be 3-wire polarized grounding type and must be enclosed in a protective outlet box. The ABYC code also requires that 120-volt AC outlets in the head, galley, machine spaces, engine room and on the weather deck be protected by a GFCI device. I would take it one step farther and **strongly recommend that all 120-volt AC outlets on your boat be GFCI.** Any AC operated tool or device on your boat should be connected to a GFCI device (outlet) and, if needed, used only with a 30-foot (or shorter) three-wire outdoor extension cord.



Any AC operated tool or device connected directly to shore power (think Power Pedestal) should also be protected by a GFCI device. Power Pedestals do not have GFCI devices; you have to provide them. There are Dockside 30A to 15A Adapter Cords with built-in Ground Fault Protection. They are expensive (around \$100), approximately three-feet long, and provide three 15-amp, 120-volt, GFCI protected, female outlets. Personally, I always plug any extension cord used on or around my boat into a GFCI protected outlet on my boat.

Never use a three-wire extension cord missing the ground pin on the plug; when a cord with a defective ground pin is discovered I always immediately cut the unsafe plug off so that the unsafe cord cannot be used. When returning a rug shampooer that my wife had rented and used, I noticed that its plug was missing the ground pin. I asked for the manager and talked Electrical Safety to him. You should have seen the expression on the store manager's face when I cut off the defective and unsafe plug.





In addition to being a Past Commander of Charleston Sail and Power Squadron and our Safety Officer, Harl also served at the USPS National Level as the Staff Commander for Marine Electronics. He is the Principal Author of the USPS course on Marine Electrical Systems.

Please advise what courses you are interested in taking beginning in September, 2015. A full listing of our courses is available on the website. I welcome your inquiries.




Updates on the CSPS Website

AGROUND IN SOUTHERN WATERS



Upon relocation to southern Gulf waters, as long time boaters we were surprised to hear that there are two kinds of boaters: those who have run aground and those who are not being honest. Running aground is an event we had always equated to poor seamanship. That is no longer our opinion!

In these waters we deal with tidal changes, sand bars that seem to appear out of nowhere, and disappearing channel markers. These variables contribute to many a boater's frustration, as well as the sustainable businesses of hull and prop/rudder repair. These are circumstances that inland waterways boaters rarely encounter. Okay, maybe they have the occasional channel marker relocation.

What is a boater to do? Just keep going out there, getting stuck then either calling a tow service or wait for higher tide? Perhaps. But there are measures a boater can take to

decrease the possibility of this event.

- 1) First and foremost, make contact with as many boaters experienced in this area, as you can. Offer to take them out on your boat, Boaters can be very generous with their knowledge.
- 2) Buy and study local charts. This seems simple, doesn't it? This leads me to...
- 3) Take classes from your local United States Power Squadrons! Reading charts seems easy, if you have read only inland charts. Red buoy/green buoy...red right returning...day marks. If these terms are foreign to you, then you need these classes more than those who understand them.

A boat and all its related expenses are an investment into the sweet life you came here to live; a new allocation of your recreational dollars. Make that investment pay off with dividends by investing the time and minimal dollars in these invaluable classes.

We have found a treasure of information, friendship, opportunities to connect more with our new community, and a confidence we truly value. This carries when out on the water, whether in the harbor, in the Gulf or paddling our kayaks in the creeks and shallow rivers we have grown to love.

As experienced boaters, we quickly purchased a boat to navigate the waters here, then, three kayaks and, recently, a PWC. Even with years of boating experience, the classes we have taken have made us more confident, more relaxed and able to better enjoy our time on the water, whatever we are doing. Our local Power Squadron members have helped to make that possible.



They should be sent to the editor as images to be inserted; editor will not be responsible for designing or formatting the ad.
- 3. All non-boating business advertisements, whether from members' businesses or non-members', may be purchased at \$20 per issue. Such ads will be limited to ¼ page or less and must be provided to the editor as images to be inserted. Editor will not be responsible for designing or formatting the ad.
- 4. Ads of a personal nature, related to boats or boating, submitted by non-members may be placed at a cost of \$10 per issue, subject to review by the editor and providing they follow all guidelines in this policy.
