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SAFE BOATING THROUGH EDUCATION

hat a great time to be involved with the Charleston Power Squadron! It is an absolute fact that no matter what your interest or talent, there is something for you in our diverse group. On the national, district and local level, USPS is in the middle of a metamorphosis of sorts. Not only is it exciting to see what's happening, but also to see how things are progressing because of these changes. At the District Spring Conference held in Greenville on 16 March, V/C Les Johnson gave a presentation on the topics that C/C Ted Smith considers important at the national level. Some of these topics include:

<u>SQUADRON MEMBER BENEFITS</u>: This is an important topic that goes to the heart of recruitment and membership retention. We are partnering with many organizations (Boat US comes to mind as an example) that will give USPS members opportunities that others simply don't have. This makes selling membership within our organization even easier than it already is.

<u>SIMPLIFYING USPS PROCEDURES</u>: To streamline paperwork redundancy and make the flow of communication at all levels of our organization more efficient, national is looking at specific ways to remove administrative log jambs that may have been an impediment in the past. The entire reorganization of the Educational Department is a good example of this.

INCREASE EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION BETWEEN USPS AND GOVERNMENT: Although we are a civilian organization, there are many ways that we can work in conjunction with governmental agencies (ex: Coast Guard) to further the goals of USPS.

<u>DEVELOPING EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP</u>: Maybe next year you'll have a Commander who can figure out the right way to fill out these darned quarterly squadron reports!

There are other goals, too. For instance:

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<u>NEW MEMBERSHIP GROWTH:</u> USPS has a national goal of 3% per year. Charleston Power Squadron's goal is currently 10%. With the 70 percent rate of people who successfully completed our last Boat Smart course signed up for membership, a 10% increase in overall membership this year with the remaining courses we plan to offer should be an easy task.

<u>LOCAL ADVERTISING IN "THE ENSIGN":</u> There are commissions (\$\$\$) involved for the squadron. Anyone can help promote this.

<u>A RENEWED EMPHASIS ON MARKETING AND PARTNERING</u>: The more people know about us, the more interested they become.

On the district level, meetings have become more streamlined, shorter, and more pertinent for the average member. With activities planned for the afternoon, as well as short informative breakout sessions immediately after the formal Council meeting, the district meetings are something all members should try to attend. Numerous members carpool to these meetings. There's always room for more!

On the squadron level, we are as busy as ever. Our Educational Department is planning more Basic Boating classes than ever before, as well as upper level courses to keep our regular membership busy advancing their educational grade. We are now looking at the possibility of purchasing a special deal through national that would give us a computer projection system with a 3-year warranty for approximately \$2,500. This sounds expensive (and it is), until you realize that this unit usually retails for around \$5,500. This would give us the ability to make seriously professional presentations in our classes (both basic and advanced grades). With Power Point® (a software package) on the computer this device would hook to, actual motion, not just "frames", could be incorporated into the display. This will, of course, be discussed at our April Executive Committee meeting (all are invited to attend).

Charleston Power Squadron has, for the 21st time, won the <u>USPS Educational Fund Certificate of Merit</u>, and so

has District 26 as a whole. CPS also won the <u>Website</u> Award along with two other squadrons in District 26. Harry Darby, as always, sets the standards. What a great job!

Harry Darby has also agreed to help scan photographs of Past District Commanders (there are about 15 of them and they are currently in my possession) into his computer so that they can be eventually be added to the D/26 website.


The Hornick Cruise will be in the past as you read this, but I know it will have been a social and educational success, as always. Congratulations to everyone who earned a new VSC decal.
